



Urban and rural life

The number of people in a place is called the **population**. People who live in a town or a city are called the **urban** population and those living in a **village** are called the **rural** population. Towns are not as big as cities and there aren't as many people. There aren't as many shopping centres, universities and stadiums in towns and villages as in cities. Cities aren't usually as clean as towns, but sometimes towns can be as **dirty** as cities. There isn't as much



traffic in villages as there is in towns or cities. In some big cities like London there are as many parks and green spaces as in smaller towns, if not more! Life in a village isn't as noisy as in a city, but village life isn't as busy as city life. Some towns are as quiet as villages and can be very interesting.


I'm writing to you because I want to have an 1... friend in a big city! I love sending emails to friends.


